Understanding your local market

Labour Market Information (LMI) is a useful tool to help research future jobs in your local area, understand the skills needed for certain roles and the demand for future employment.

Understanding LMI is becoming more and more important as the world changes, so that all young people can be aware of where different job roles that are needed around the country and what types of jobs may need more people in the future.

Learning from career and labour market information also aligns to Gatsby Benchmark 2, enabling young people to inform their own decisions on study options as well as to source meaningful work experiences which match their skills, interests and talents.






