
# What is an Accessible Apprenticeship?

Accessible Apprenticeships are paid jobs that combine onthe-job training and learning. They provide a pathway to gain practical skills, earn a wage, and achieve recognised qualifications







- Learn by doing real work in your chosen industry
- Receive a salary while training
- Gain industry-recognised qualifications
- Apprenticeships can lead to permanent roles or higher-level apprenticeships.
  - Build relationships and explore future



- Age: 16+ years
- Eligibility: You must have a current or historic EHCP plan and have achieved at least Functional Skills Entry Level 3 in maths and English
- Commitment: Be sure about the industry you would like to work in
- Employer: Find an employer willing to hire you as an apprentice. We can provide you with information to help you find one.

• Your form will be checked to make sure you are suitable for an apprenticeship

• Duration: Apprenticeships can last from 1-4 years



- If you haven't already found an employer, Targeted Employment can provide you with information on how to find one
- All apprenticeships require you to have an interview. We can support you with this process and with any adjustments you may need.
- If you are successful, a date can then be agreed for you apprenticeship to start

What makes an apprenticeship "accessible"?

- Changes can be made to working hours (minimum 20 hours per week) and the length of the apprenticeship
- Support is available through the training provider
- Adjustments, such as extra time can be made to the End Point Assessment
- For Level 2 apprenticeships, maths and English can be lowered to Functional Skills Entry Level 3
- Job Coaching support may be available through <u>Get Set UK</u>



#### Becoming work ready

- Visit the <u>National Careers service</u> website or speak to your SEND Careers Advisor
- Create a CV and make sure it is up to date
- Write a <u>Support Profile/Profile for work</u> which will help employers understand any help you may need
- Use <u>Employer tool kits</u> such Beyond Autism and Ambitious about Autism (on p7 of our pathways guide)
- Visit the <u>Essex Opportunities</u> hub for top tips such as writing a cover letter or interview skills
